July 5th - Arguments for and against 'Same Sex' Marriage in Church.

This week World Refugee Day is remembered on the 20th June.

The United Nations General Assembly launched this event in the year 2000. Since then the worldwide community has spent each 20th of June focusing on ways in which the lives of refugees can be improved.

Did you know Albert Einstein, the Nobel Prize Winner, well known for his scientific discoveries was a refugee? He was forced to flee Europe due to the rise of the Nazi Party in Germany and fled to the United States.

Freddy Mercury, the lead singer of Queen was also a refugee. He was born on the Island of Zanzibar and was forced to leave with his family when a violent revolution destabilized the Island. The family moved to London where Freddy then met his band mates.

Jesus was a refugee. The flight into Egypt is a story recounted in the Gospel of Matthew. Matthew Ch 2 v 13-23

"An Angel appeared to Joseph in a dream telling him to flee to Egypt with Mary and the infant Jesus since King Herod would seek the child to kill him"

We cannot imagine how difficult it is, leaving all we are familiar with, due to it being unsafe to stay, to then have a long difficult journey, with a hope that we will be welcomed and be able to adjust to a new way of life in a strange land.

Kate Milner has written a beautiful children's book called 'My name is not Refugee' which highlights some of these issues.

When I was Curate at Christ Church I had an Asylum Seeker from Zimbabwe, (whose brother had been killed by President Mugabe) stay in my house for eight years as we waited for his Asylum to be granted.

During that time I began to see how traumatic life was for him.

A respected bank manager in his own country, he was seen here as a parasite by many. He wanted to acquire a job to pay his way, yet was not allowed to work.

With no control over his life's circumstances his self esteem plummeted and he soon struggled with depression. People often asked him to do jobs, but very few people took time to talk with him, to listen to him discovering who he really was.

I remember on one occasion he returned to our home and he was so excited because a gentleman on Liverpool Road had invited him into his house, (after my friend had been gardening for his next-door neighbour). They sat talking for over two hours, drinking tea and eating chocolate biscuits. This simple act of kindness, being treated with dignity, meant so much to my friend and helped restore his self worth.

So this week let us take time to consider the 84 million people forcibly displaced from their homes and the 26.6 million refugees.

The theme for this years World Refugee Day is 'Compassion'.

Our circuit service last Sunday explored the theme of showing compassion to ourselves and others. Let's make it so!
