Dear Friends



...as it is written in Isaiah the prophet: "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way"—"a voice of one calling in the wilderness,'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him."

(Mark Ch 1 vs 2-3)

This week our Advent focus is on John the Baptist who some describe as the last of the great prophets. Prophets often unwelcome as the spoke of an uncomfortable reality rooted in God that was not always to their listeners liking.

This week there were two news stories that caught my attention. The first was the former Prime Minister speaking at the Covid inquiry. The inquiry is currently exploring the core political and administrative governance and decision-making during Covid. One of the things that has struck me, not just from listening to Boris Johnson, but to other witnesses, has been the lack of someone in the machinery of government, set aside to consider the moral issues raised during the Covid crisis. We hear of discussions as to whether to let Covid rip through the country, verses the need to be cautious. There were even claims that some advocated that the elderly, who would suffer most, should be sacrificed for those younger in the population. There were obviously scientists, civil servants and politicians in the room(s), but who was the expert to offer the ballast on the moral implications? No one from what I can see. We have bishops and other faith leaders in the House of Lords who may have been able to provide such a voice; perhaps they are deemed irrelevant?

This week the government finally gave its response to the Hillsborough Independent Panel recommendations. The panel, you may recall, was headed by the The Right Reverend James Jones, then the Bishop of Liverpool, chosen for the role because he would be independent and deemed to be acceptable by all sides of the debate.

May people of faith, in whatever room they find themselves, be people who are able to bring a Kingdom of God perspective.
