

Dear Friends

As I write this we are coming towards the end of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (18-25th January). Each year Churches Together in Britain and Ireland provide resources to aid reflection (if interested you can find them at https://ctbi.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/2023/09/WPCU-2024-English-pamphlet-Final.pdf). This year the churches of Burkina Faso have provided the resources as they invite us to join with them in a process of self-reflection as they consider what it means to love our neighbour in the midst of a security crisis.

They use the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke Ch 10 vs 25-37). I am sure we know the story well, that when a man is attacked by robbers, a priest and a Levite pass by on the other side whilst a Samaritan goes to his aid. Then Jesus asks...

"Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

(Luke Ch 10 vs 37-38)

From this I wonder if the story should be titled the Parable of Mercy. A dictionary definition of mercy states, "if someone in authority shows mercy, they choose not to harm someone they have power over, or they forgive someone they have the right to punish."

We are called by Jesus to go and do likewise. We remember that we receive the mercy of God and through this experience we are empowered to share mercy with others. Others is all embracing, it has no boundaries. As churches and Christians, our energies are often focused inward within our own congregations and denominations. We can become trapped in focusing on our differences and being critical of nuances between us, that we fail to show mercy to one another, let alone to "others" within the wider world.

Wherever we find ourselves worshipping, may we be known by the mercy we offer to all.
