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Dear Friends

"Possibility beyond the probable is the nature of Christian Hope."

(Stephen A Cooper - Associate Professor of Religious Studies, Franklin & Marshall College, Pennsylvania).

A friend when battling a life threatening illness would often say "fear the worse, hope the best". I find hope to be so important, it's one of the most precious commodities I think I possess. Where would I be without it; I'd be hopeless.

In the Christian faith, hope takes on a very different dimension. Whilst difficulties exist, there is the everlasting hope, the eternal hope. However difficult things can be, our Christian hope helps us to see the world through a different lens. Life may seek to condition us that various situations are probably going to turn out for the worse because we've been conditioned to anticipate this; perhaps as a self defence mechanism so that we won't be disappointed.

This may have been how the disciples felt after the crucifixion, although they hadn't anticipated the birth of Christianity, with Hope at it's core, was about to burst forth and that possibility beyond the probable was the new kid on the block.

While they were still talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and frightened, thinking they saw a ghost...

...Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. He told them, "This is what is written: The Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, and repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

(Luke Ch 24 vs 36-37 & 45-48)

For us as individual Christians and collectively as the Church, have we become stuck in the world view that the probable will happen or are we hopeful that the possible will prevail, for through the resurrection it already has. I wonder if I stop and pause enough to appreciate the occasions when the possible has prevailed, to see life through resurrection lenses. May we be open to be startled by God moving among us.
