Dear Friends

"Waste not want not" is a phrase I can remember from childhood. Its meaning is that if you use something carefully and without extravagance, you will always have enough and never be in need.

"I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (John Ch 10 vs 10).

Jesus reminds us that we should no longer be overwhelmed by sin and those things that create a barrier between us and God; rather we are released by his abundant grace for it overflows, it will never run out.

With the autumn equinox having just passed, it certainly feels like a new season. Many have already or soon will be celebrating harvest. Some crops have had an abundant year like the plums, pears and grapes in my garden, whilst farmers have had low yields on other crops due to the lack of rainfall and exceptionally high temperatures. A frequently used Harvest bible passage is the feeding of the 5000.

Jesus then took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed to those who were seated as much as they wanted. He did the same with the fish.

(John Ch 6 vs 11).

From an insurmountable problem of how to feed 5000 people, there was an abundance of food so that everyone had as much as they wanted (not just as much as they needed!). What really struck me on reading the story again is the next verse.

"Gather the pieces that are left over. Let nothing be wasted." (John Ch 6 vs 12b).

When there is an abundance of a commodity the price for it decreases, and in our minds we probably devalue it and worry less about wastage. We are not told what they did with the twelve baskets that were gathered together? As they travelled on or returned home, surely they would have shared it with those they met. Often after church events, and especially wakes, we take the food that is left over to the weekday foodbank at Shoreline Church, or the Soup Kitchen at weekends.

When we have received an abundance of blessings from God, as much as we have wanted, especially his grace, do we in turn gather up the excess pieces and share God's abundance and grace with those we meet as we continue on our journey?

God's abundant grace is precious, let nothing be wasted.
