Exploring our Image of God

Jesus asked his disciple Peter,

'Who do you say that I am?' (Mark 8:29) — and sooner or later, that same question will be asked of us. Our image of God can be shaped by our upbringing, our storehouse of Scripture or stories from our faith tradition, our experiences of the power of our caregivers and teachers, the doctrines and customs of a particular faith community, our individual and corporate religious/spiritual experiences, representations of God/Jesus in the media, arts or literature, and whether we have suffered abuse or trauma. Each person's image of God is complex and unique.

Imagine Jesus asking you, 'Who do you say that I am?' How would you respond?

Our answer to this question is affected not only by our formative experiences but also by major life events such as birth, migration, grief, and death, which have particular power to shape or challenge how we look at God.

If our faith is to have the tough integrity which can respond to suffering without saying platitudes; if we want to be able to trust the loving care of God in the midst of tragedy, we have to have the courage to look at our image of God.

What is your current understanding of where God is when 'bad things happen to good people'?

Years ago, Viktor Frankl, a Jewish psychiatrist and author of Man's Search for Meaning, witnessed people being hanged in a concentration camp. Someone near him muttered, 'Where is God now?' and, from another prisoner, Frankl heard the words.

'He is there, hanging on the gibbet.' Somehow that prisoner had come to see the vulnerability of our Father God, who chose the way of powerlessness and pain, experiencing what it can mean to be fully human.

His Son Jesus shows us that love in His life and death — a love that risks undefended openness to life with all its beauty as well as its suffering, a love that remains with us now, through thick and thin, as the Comforter, the Holy Spirit.
